Pacific Climate Ambition & Leadership Framework

Level of Ambition:

All Pacific Peoples are resilient to climate change and disasters, living safe, secure, and prosperous lives. The Pacific remains a global leader in climate action.

Goals

G1. Build climate and disaster resilience for all Pacific peoples

G2. Maintain and strengthen the Pacific's leadership in global climate action

Outcomes (with Goals)

1.0 Improved resilience to climate change and disasters (G1)

1.1 Just transition to low-carbon, climate-resilient infrastructure and technologies (G1)

1.2 Strengthened capacity for adaptation and response, especially for vulnerable groups (G1)

1.3 Enhanced ability to address economic and non-economic loss and damage from climate events (G1)

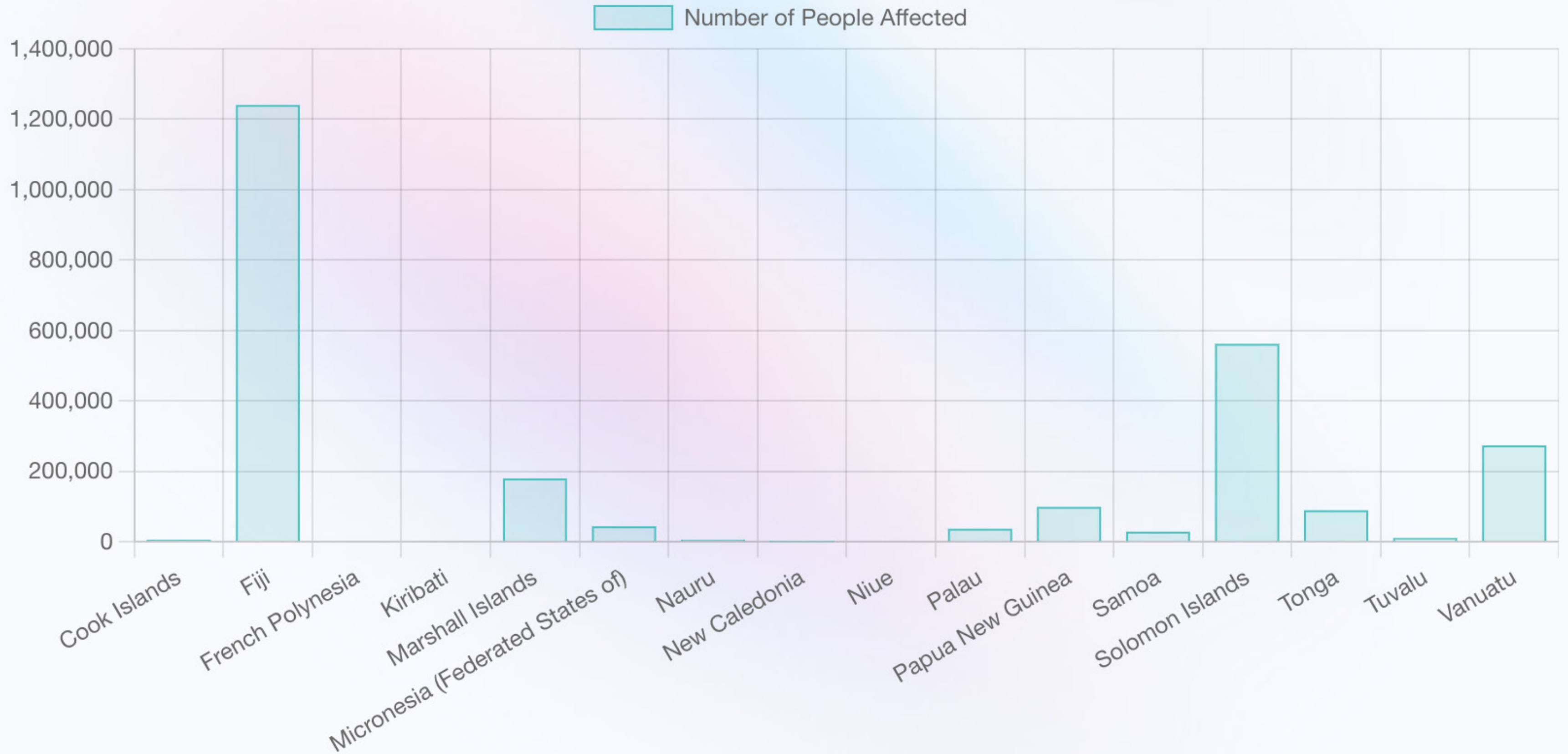
1.4 Improved access to climate and disaster finance through stronger institutional and absorptive capacity (G1)

2.0 Regional climate leadership on the global stage (G2)

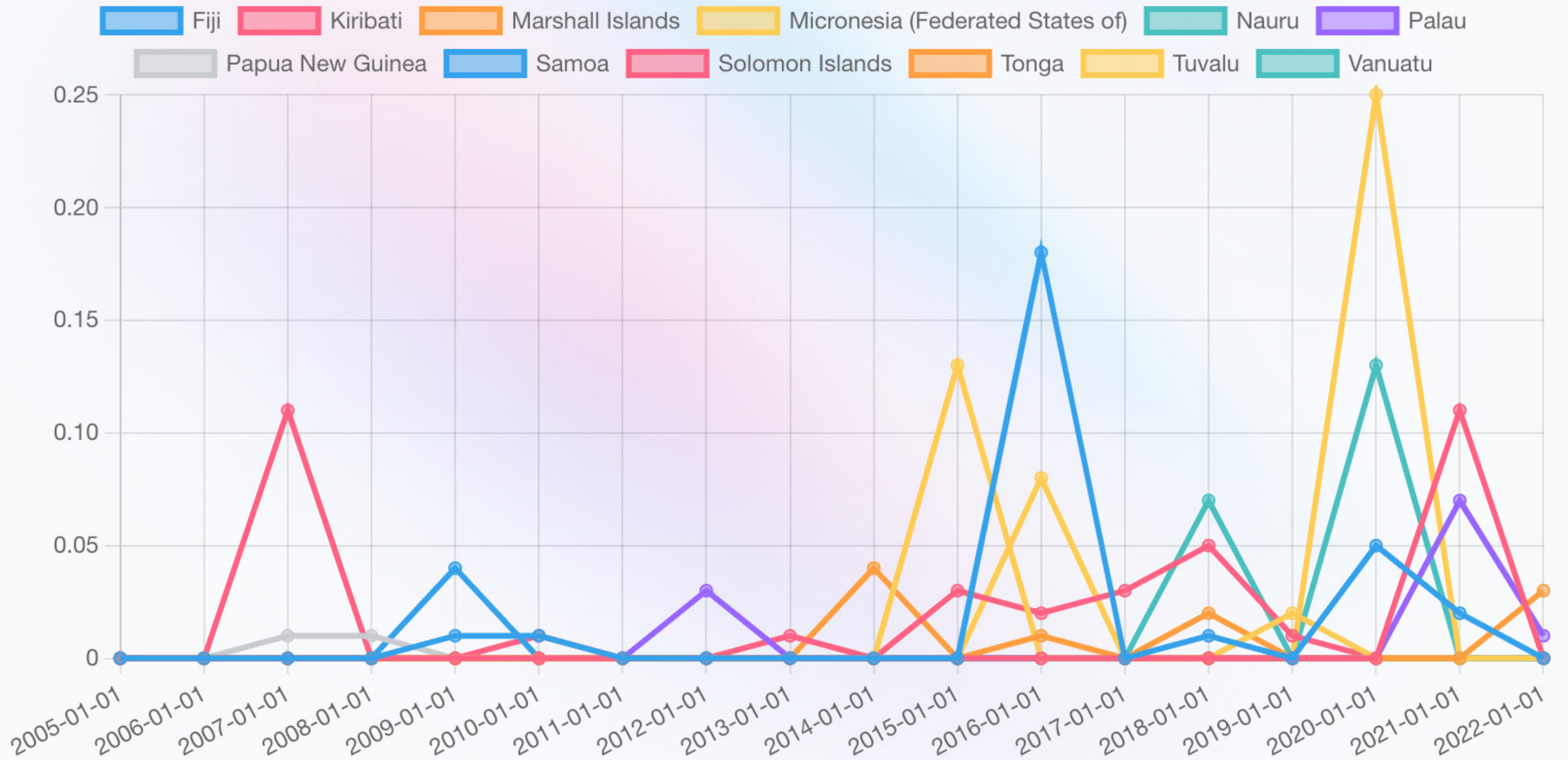
2.1 The Pacific influences global policy to limit warming to 1.5°C (G2)

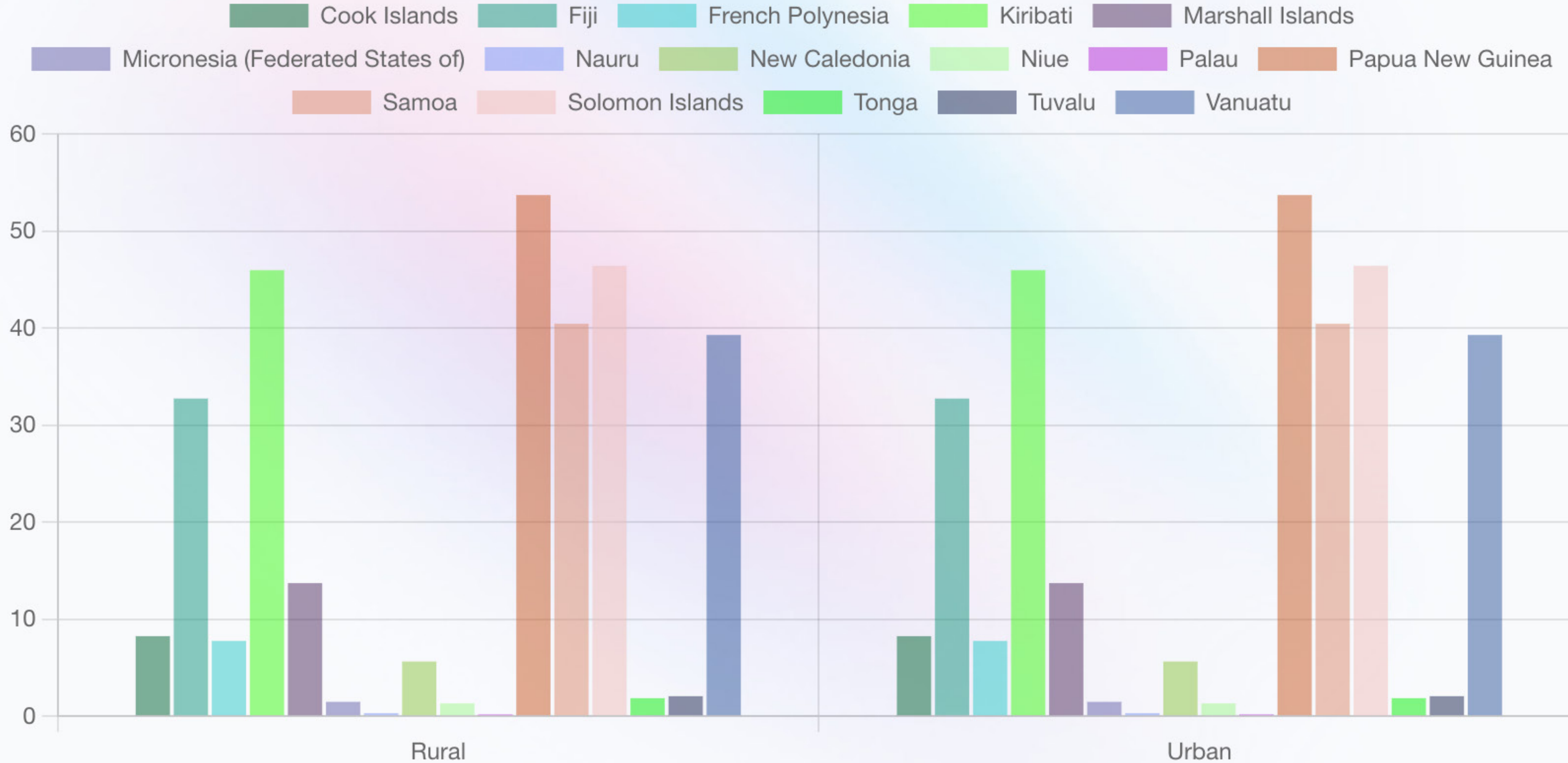


Direct economic loss attributed to disasters relative to GDP

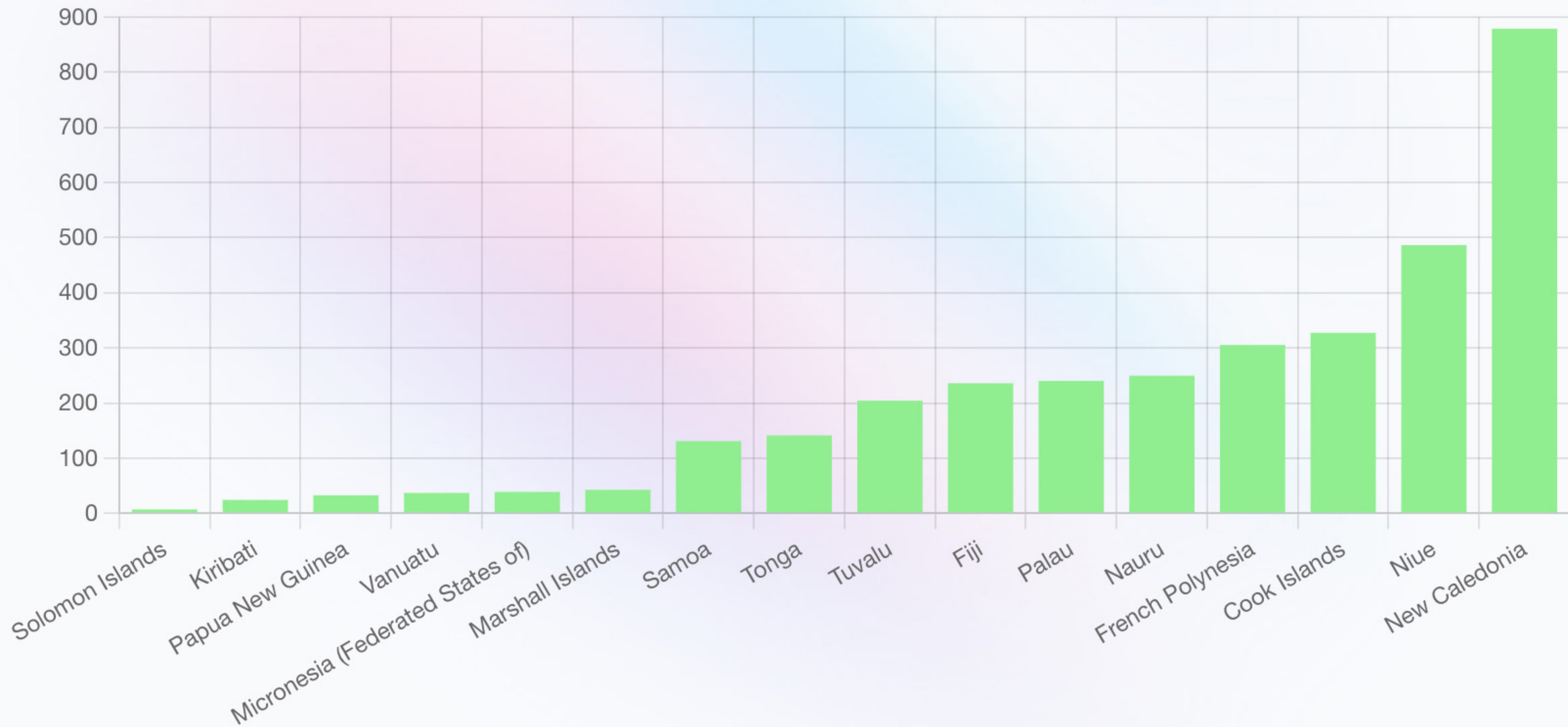


Renewable energy share in the total final energy consumption

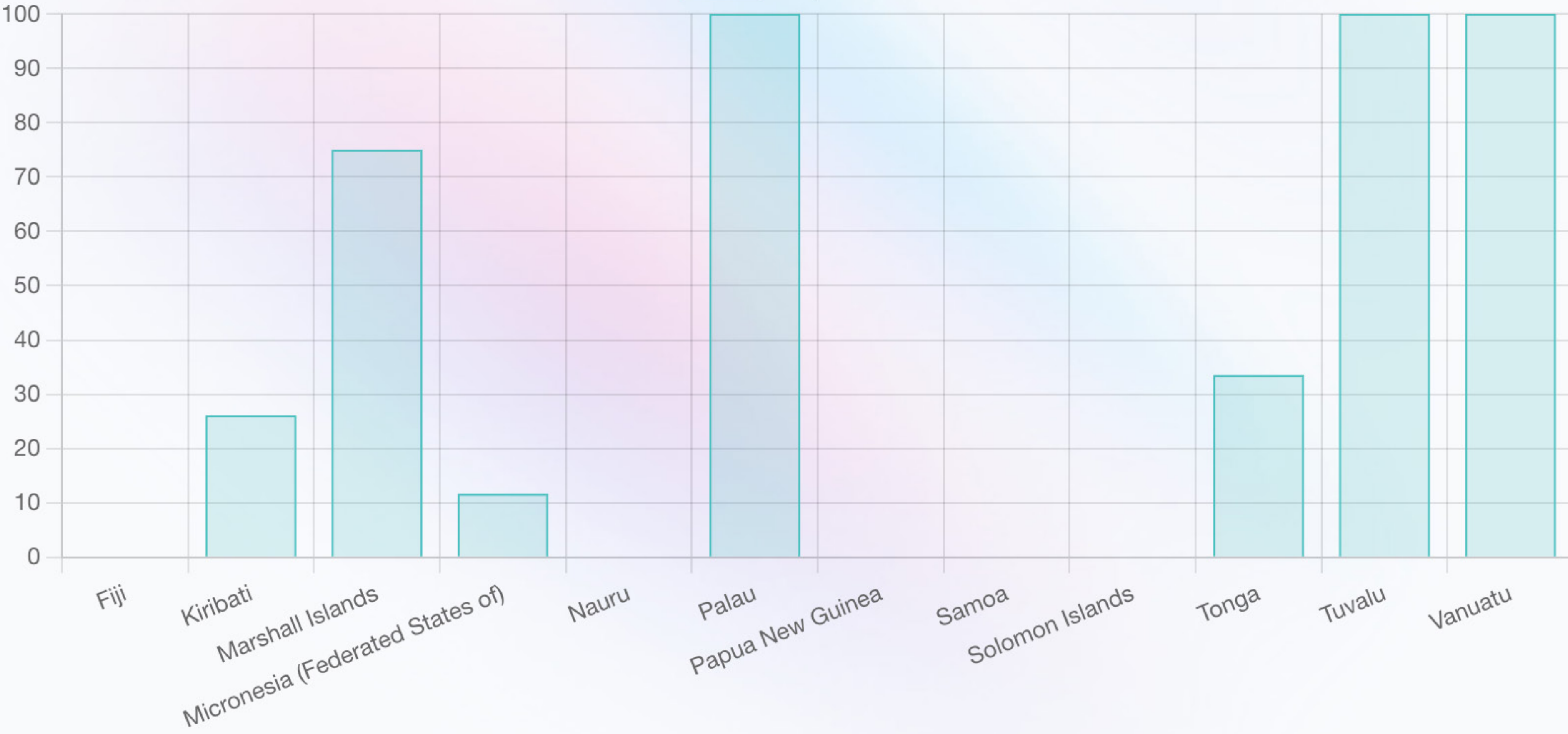

Proportion

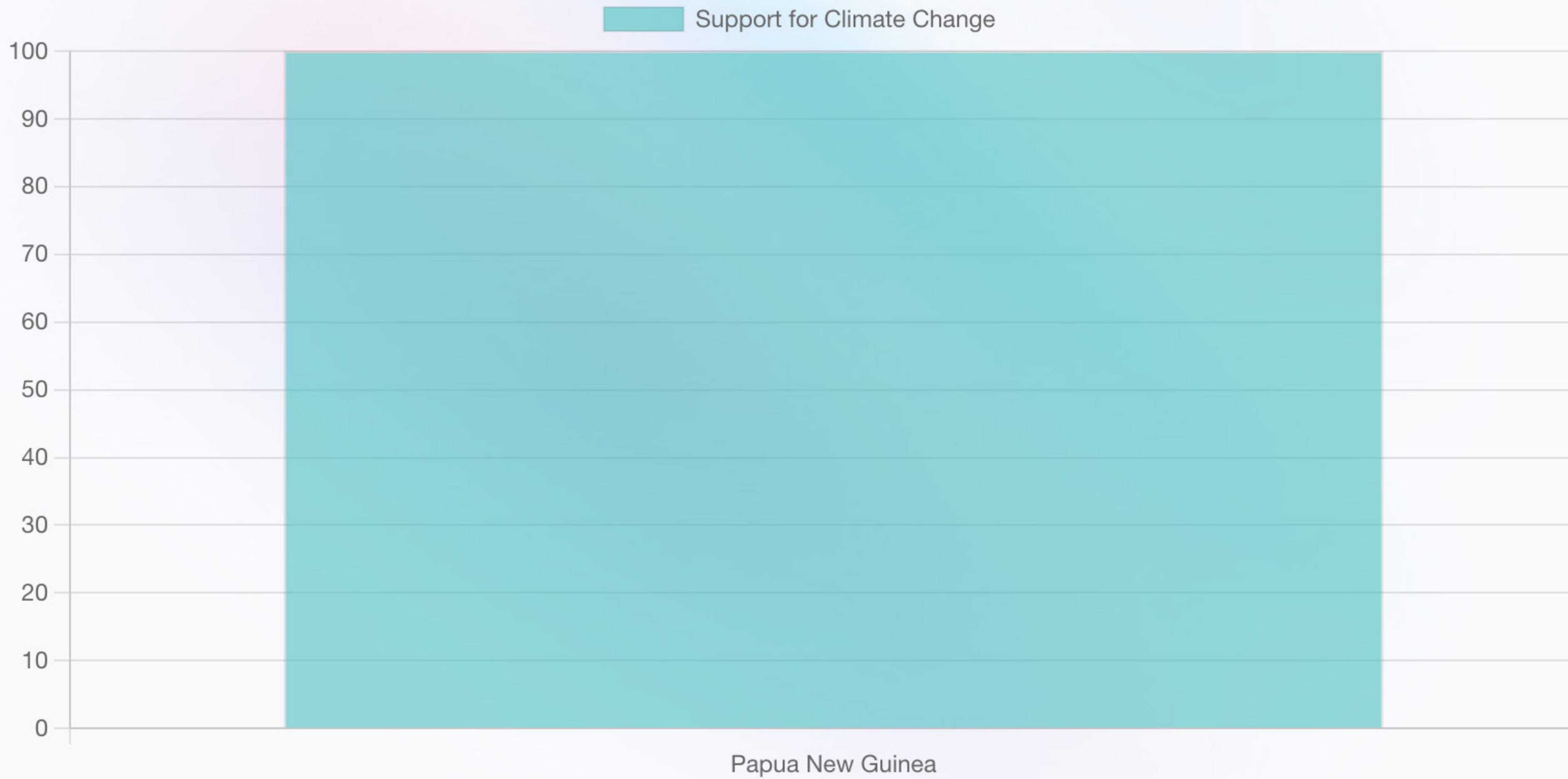


Countries with legislative and/or regulatory provisions been made for managing disaster risk

The Pacific region aspires for all Pacific Peoples to live safe, secure, and prosperous lives—resilient to the impacts of climate change and disasters. At the same time, the region aims to sustain its leadership in global climate action.

Two overarching goals shape this ambition:

G1: Strengthening the resilience of Pacific communities to climate change and disasters.

G2: Reinforcing the Pacific's role as a global climate leader.

To achieve these, the framework outlines key outcomes:

Promoting just transitions to low-carbon, climate-resilient infrastructure and technologies.

Enhancing adaptive capacity of Pacific governments and communities, with focus on the most vulnerable.

Addressing loss and damage from both rapid and slow-onset events.

Improving access to climate and disaster finance, supported by institutional capacity.

Influencing global climate policies to keep global warming below 1.5°C.

Ensuring Pacific Small Island Developing States (SIDS) have equitable and simplified access to global climate finance tailored to their unique needs.

While some outcomes still lack indicators, ongoing efforts by the Monitoring, Evaluation and Learning (MEL) Working Group and Thematic Advisory Groups will strengthen the monitoring framework. New indicators will be integrated into the dashboard as they are developed and endorsed.

This regional vision reflects the Pacific's unified stance on resilience, equity, and leadership in shaping a sustainable global climate future.
